FROM PASTOR MARIE

Hello and thank you! I am so blessed to have been called by you and to now be here as your new associate pastor. I am also grateful for everyone who has warmly welcomed me and the opportunities I've already had to get to know you all better. Keep them coming! I'm working on learning names but learning your stories and personalities along with your names is even better! However, since an article is a little one-sided I thought I'd take the opportunity to share a little bit about me and my hopes for entering into ministry with you all!

As many of you may already know, the three main focuses of my position here at Christ Lutheran are to be visitation, education and preaching. And though it is only my third week here, I have already been diving into all three of these areas! In my first week, I was privileged to teach confirmation and spend several hours with some wonderful youth of the church. I also was honored to teach the opening session on the Gospel of Mark for Faith University. Education has always been a passion of mine. I grew up with a father who was a professor, and even as a child loved to play "school" and couldn't wait until I was old enough to go to school. And once I did get to go I just kept going ... for twenty-one years (kindergarten through seminary)! It was in college that I became particularly interested and passionate about learning about the Bible, theology and religion. My religious studies in college were not only a major part of my deepening faith life but also inspired me to go to seminary.

I am excited to now dive into study with all of you and am especially interested in hearing your ideas about what subjects and/or formats of study are most helpful in deepening your faith life. For example, does Faith University fit your needs, or are you looking for a study that you can do with your own small group? Do you want to delve deeply into biblical study or do you need some time for devotion and practice in spiritual disciplines? Whatever it is, I'm excited to hear your ideas and needs!

I've also had the opportunity to start visitation with some of our members who have been in the hospital and was blessed to get to meet our Eucharistic ministers and hear about the amazing ministry that they are already providing. I'm excited to be working with these wonderful volunteers to ensure that all members are getting the care they need. We are also in the midst of visioning and exploring ways to expand visitation ministry, so be on the lookout for new caring ministry opportunities in the near future.

Guest Preacher and Teacher – Rev. Dr. Stanley N. Olson

On Sunday, February 26, Christ Lutheran is pleased to welcome Rev. Dr. Stanley N. Olson, President of Wartburg Theological Seminary. Before becoming President of Wartburg Seminary in 2010, Rev. Olson served as the Executive Director of Vocation and Education in the church-wide offices of the ELCA. In this role he has provided leadership for the church's partnerships with its seminaries, colleges and universities, lifelong learning programs, outdoor ministries and campus ministries, as well as supporting young adult and youth ministries and guiding the ELCA candidacy program. Rev. Olson also served as the Executive Director of the Division for Ministry of the ELCA from 2002 to 2005; Bishop of the ELCA's Southwestern Minnesota Synod; senior pastor of Our Savior's Lutheran Church in New Ulm, MN; and associate pastor of First Lutheran Church in Duluth, MN. In the years between those parish calls, he served as a professor of New Testament at Luther Seminary in St. Paul, MN.

Rev. Olson has a wide range of experiences in the church and a depth of knowledge that he shares with grace and eloquence. We are excited that he will visit CLC and share his gifts with us, preaching at both services and speaking at Faith University at 9:15 a.m. on the topic, “Theological Education: The Formation of Professional Leaders for the Church.”

Some fun facts about Rev. Olson:

- He is Pastor Marie's uncle ... and he preached at her ordination service!
- Our own Darwin Huartson served as youth director at First Lutheran Church in Duluth, MN at the same time that Rev. Olson was the associate pastor there.

We had so much going on at Christ Lutheran during Advent and Christmas, you would think it did all happen at once! Fortunately, due to God's creation of Time, it happened over four weeks so we had the opportunity to participate and be enriched by the wide variety of events during the season of the Messiah's birth.

For me, the highlights were many. With Mary Overstreet's artistic talents, Robert Teander's leadership and a host of enthusiastic volunteers, our sanctuary was decorated in the spirit of the season - resulting in a beautiful and inspiring worship environment. Our children delighted us with song during the lighting of the Advent candles each Sunday. The Wednesday night Advent services using the Holden Evening Prayer offered a much-needed time of reflection and a mid-week reminder of the approaching birth of the Christ child. The handbell concert by the River City Ringers was the perfect way to musically punctuate the season. And David Kaufman's service of Hope for the Holidays was well-attended by members and visitors who have lost loved ones and were seeking solace and community.

We also had many opportunities to help others. Over 20 members of our congregation - including eight of our youth - brought Christian love and Christmas cheer to families at SAMM Santa's Workshop at Haven for Hope. And through the generosity of our members, 50 less fortunate children and adults enjoyed the multitudes of brightly-wrapped gifts and food given to the Family Service Association Adopt-an-Angel program.

We had 31 children and five youth bring the Christmas story to reality for us all in the Christmas pageant. At the service of Lessons and Carols, we were moved by early American, German and Spanish music supporting scriptures that foretold the coming of the Messiah.

And almost 500 members and visitors worshipped with us on Christmas Eve! Wasn't it exciting to see so many of our members' extended families attend both services? One quick story. During the preparation for the lighting of the candles, the choir moved down the outside aisles to sing Silent Night, and my wife, Karin, was positioned next to John and Claudia Malitz's large clan. Their new grandbaby, Grace, was disgruntled and all efforts by Stephanie and Jimmy to calm her with the pacifier were being rejected. She continued to cry while the ushers were lighting the candles. Her face was tense and she was not happy despite all of our anticipation for the coming of the Christ child.

Then Peter Gross began playing "Silent Night" and the choir started singing in German. Suddenly as if by magic, sweet Gracie's face relaxed, her eyes closed and she drifted off to a peaceful sleep. No kidding ... peace on earth. See, we Lutherans with our singing in German about the birth of Jesus IS still magic! (And now the Malitz family is hurriedly downloading all of the German music they can find for sweet baby Grace.)

Thanks to Pastor Leslie, our tireless office staff and all of you for making this such a memorable Christmas! And special thanks to our Maker for coming up with the concept of Time...

What is the "Exchange of Peace?"

First be reconciled to your brother or sister. . .

For some people, the moments in the liturgy following the prayers of the church are awkward ones. The presiding minister offers these words: "The peace of Christ be with you always." The congregation responds "And also with you." The members of the congregation are then invited to "share the peace" with one another. What does that really mean?

Sharing God's peace is *not* simply offering a friendly hello to those sitting around you. Sharing God's peace is *not* a time for catching up on news with your neighbor or for reminding someone about an upcoming meeting. Sharing God's peace does *not* require each worshiper to offer a sign of God's peace to every other worshiper present.

Sharing God's peace with one another is an act of reconciliation. It is an opportunity for God's people to be reconciled with one another as they offer their gifts to God and before they receive the gift of Holy Communion.

Jesus' Sermon on the Mount, as recorded in Matthew's Gospel, lays a foundation for the practice of sharing God's peace. "So when you are offering your gift at the altar, if you remember that your brother or sister has something against you, leave your gift there before the altar and go; first be reconciled to your brother or sister, and then come and offer your gift" (Matthew 5:23-24).

That the sharing of the peace follows the prayers of the church is not accidental. Having been forged into a common people in Holy Baptism, the congregation prays for peace in the Church, peace in the world, and peace for all those in need. Then the congregation follows through with the people offering peace and reconciliation to one another. This is not human peace alone, but the peace which is possible only through Christ. Then, after the exchange of peace, material gifts are offered to God, for the well-being and peace of the Church, the world, and its people. Finally, having prayed for and enacted the peace, we receive the Holy Communion.

Seen in context, it is clear why the exchange of Christ's peace is not a time for saying "Good morning," or for commenting on a neighbor's new outfit, or for reminding someone about next week's potluck supper. It is, rather, a time to set aside our human differences and to recognize and enact our baptismal unity as children of God.

What can the exchange of peace teach us for daily living? Christians are a people who seek reconciliation with one another. Making peace is a daily action in our lives. We do not need to wait to come to church on Sunday morning in order to make peace with our neighbors and our family members. Sharing God's peace is a daily opportunity.

CLC benevolence reaches far into the non-profit community. Our Benevolence Committee awards gifts to dozens of area organizations that serve the poor, the hungry, the homeless, the voiceless and others who need a helping hand. Twenty percent of our regular offerings support benevolence.

Our members are also visible in the community, giving of their time and resources as volunteers. One of the organizations that has been featured at our spring Benevolence Fairs to build their corps of volunteers is Child Advocates of San Antonio (CASA). Two of our members – Gene Norris and Dale Anderson – have served as longtime volunteers and if others of you are involved with CASA, please let us know.

CASA is continually seeking volunteers to become court-appointed special advocates for children who have been removed from their homes because of abuse and neglect. CASA volunteers make incredible differences in the lives of the children they serve. Their influence can keep siblings together in safe and permanent homes through adoption by relatives or other loving families. Volunteers receive 33 hours of initial training and are asked to pursue an additional 12 hours of continuing education.
